"I will also leave in the midst of thee an afflicted and poor people, and they shall trust in the name of the Lord" — Zephaniah 3:12.

Daily Sacrifice, May 25 (2:3)

"Seek ye the Lord, all ye meek of the earth, which have wrought His judgment; seek righteousness, seek meekness: it may be ye shall be hid in the day of the Lord's anger"— Zephaniah 2:3.

AS we read this verse we are reminded of our Lord's words, "Take My yoke upon you, and learn of Me; for I am meek and lowly in heart." Meekness is not a characteristic of ruined man who is far more likely to be lifted up in pride than to take a lowly place before God, and yet the place of meekness is the place of blessing; it is the meek who shall inherit the earth. The admonition to seek meekness implies the rarity of this virtue; it is found only in fellowship with Christ.
